PRESENT SIMPLE TENSE

HOW TO FORM?

POSITIVE FORM

I / You / We / They sing.
He / She / It sings.

NEGATIVE FORM

I / You / We / They don't sing.

He / She / It doesn't sing.

QUESTION FORM

Do I / you / we / they sing?

Does he / she / it sing?

POSITIVE ANSWERS

Yes, I / you / we / they do. Yes, he / she / it does.

NEGATIVE ANSWERS

No, I / you / we / they don't.

No, he / she / it doesn't.
